

Heat stays on for holiday weekend

The long weekend reduced auctions to a trickle, but reports indicated the day went well for vendors. A four-bedroom Victorian in

Collingwood, needing full renova tion, opened with a \$700,000 bid from a young couple, but was then passed in. They went inside 133 Keele Street, and quickly negotiated a sale with agents Nelson Alex-

ander at \$715,000, buyer's advocate

Paul Osborne said. There are few people who want to do a major renovation in that part of Collingwood, Mr Osborne said. "It [was] a very working-class area... and a lot of places have been left untouched since the day of inception. Also, the buyer demographic tends to be younger, with

less spending power.' Another property - not ideal due to its location on a main road - was nevertheless snapped up. An unrenovated, 1930s three-bedroom art deco house at 350 Burke Road, Glen Iris, drew three bidders Hocking Stuart auctioneer Steve Burke took bids from \$910,000 to a sale at \$1.06 million. The reserve

was \$1 million. "We found the long weekend worked very well for that property, being on a main road," he said. "If you get 1000-1200 auctions on one day, buyers can head into the side streets" to other properties.
